STORY:

At Element we believe it is important for people around us to understand the changes that are taking place in our own lives based on the work of Christ in us. To help others understand what Baptism is and what it means to those being baptized on a personal level, we have asked them to share their life and stories with you, those attending and those online, in a more personal way than maybe you are use to.

In Baptism we are making a public statement about our life and commitment to walk in the ways Jesus calls us. Many people only get the Jesus "as seen on TV" and don't understand what Jesus does in "real life" or what following Him looks like on a practical level. Baptism is not magical, but it is a deeply spiritual event that reflects the work Jesus has done in our lives. The act of Baptism is symbolic in that we identify with the death and resurrection of Christ. We are essentially being buried (by going under the water) and raised to walk in new life (by coming out of the water).

The entire point is public identification with Christ and His work within us. That He is our great God and Savior that has come to restore a broken humanity that cannot have a relationship with God on our own. He is the Redeemer, He is the Remedy, He is the Hope, and He is our Life.

We also have the hope that one day you too will come to the saving knowledge of trusting in Jesus with your life. It makes all the difference in the world.

Hi! My name is Katie Steiner. My husband Shawn and I have lived in Santa Maria for about 20 years. On October 5th of this year we will have been married 16 years! We have two beautiful kids, Maura and Martin. Our family has been attending Element for about five years. Our Element church family has been a great blessing for us!

I grew up in Northern California in a family that didn't attend church on a very regular basis. My mom and step-dad were very loving. However, unfortunately, as a young child I did suffer sexual abuse from a family member. That event would lead to self-destructive behaviors for me in my teen years. When I was 15 years old, I was baptized by a Lutheran church in Chico, CA. However, I was in a very unhealthy place in my life. I was battling an eating disorder and a drug addiction. My heart was too hardened to fully let God in.

Shawn and I met in Northern California when I was very much a work in progress. I was 19 years old and still a bit lost, but I like to think I was getting better. He took me on hikes and got me outdoors. Eventually Shawn was hired on with Santa Barbara County Fire and we moved to Santa Maria; we have since moved again and now live in the tiny town of Buellton.

My hubby is my rock. In 2010 I suffered an ectopic pregnancy and my mind started to think that it was my punishment from God for horrendous things I had done in my past. Shawn taught me that that isn't who God is; I remember that it was at that point I decided I wanted to learn and know who God really is. My heart started to open

Shawn and I have been through a lot together. Shawn went through a health crisis and almost lost his life in the Spring of 2013. This was the beginning of a challenging three-year journey for our family. Right before this crisis happened, though, the Lord

delivered us to Element's door. We could not have taken this journey without the huge support of family, friends, and our Element family and ultimately Jesus.

About four years ago, I searched for and made contact with my biological father! I grew up with no contact or communication with him up until then. Having a family and children of my own brought a sense of curiosity and a desire to complete my history. He lives in Ohio and our relationship has been a very good and welcomed one!

I recently went through the Redemption Group ministry at Element, it was an amazing experience! The group offered a safe, loving environment where I was able to realize my sin of pride, but also how the guilt and shame I bore from my past was not mine to carry. It was a beautiful reminder of who our God truly is: forgiving, loving, and almighty. Our God is so great that He would wait on such a wayward sheep such like me and bring me home to Him!

I'd like to share the Psalm I wrote as a part of my Redemption Group experience:

"You waited for me with open arms. As I ran, unknowing, bent to hurt myself. You waited for me with open arms.

When I thought I'd been abandoned and sought comfort in sin. You waited for me with open arms.

After shame and insecurities held me back from Your light. You waited for me with open arms.

I can not fathom Your patience as I ran astray, confused and vengeful.

I do not give myself the credit. All that I am now is a new creation made by Your mercy and grace.

I have run into Your open arms.

Your name I call out when I hurt now.

You embrace me with Your open arms.

And now I wait. With anticipation, faith, and a growing trust in You."

DEION WOODARD

My name is Deion Woodard and I'm 24 years old. I was born and raised in Nashville, Tennessee.

Being from the "Bible Belt" I have been raised in a church my entire life. My mom made sure that above all we had a strong foundation in God. When I was 7 I accepted Jesus to be my Savior, but at the time I didn't truly know exactly what it meant to be "saved." As I got older and studied the Bible the more I grew closer with God.
